It gives me great pleasure to table this third Cricket Southern Bayside Annual Report.

The 2018/19 season, like those before them can only be described as a huge success both on and off the field. On the field our Men's Turf competition continues to be the envy of metropolitan Melbourne, the women's competition has grown from 1 division to 2, and our Master's competition welcomed 2 new teams.

Our representative program expanded to include the first CSB men's game against SECA. We were able to utilise our relationship with ISEC, SECA and the AGCC to provide opportunities for U/13 boys and girls to participate in a development program with Cricket Tasmania. And we made history with our women participating in the first ever Victorian senior women's Inter Association game against the NMCA in February. It is our expectation that all these programs will continue in the years ahead.

In the Indoor cricket space, we have added a women's team to our National Indoor program, partnered with the Springvale Seahawks to create the CSB Seahawks in the Victorian Super League competition, and most importantly we have established the CSB Junior Indoor Cricket league. This innovative competition will see nearly 200 U/12 and U/14 cricketers continue their love of the game through the cold winter months.

In short, we have more clubs, more teams, more competitions and more choices as we continue to deliver on our commitment to "provide the best cricketing experience for all participants and stakeholders at all levels of involvement". All this whilst providing a strong financial result and stable governance, highlighting that it is possible to be innovative whilst respecting the rich history of our great game.

The year began with much excitement following the May 2018 signing of a Heads of Agreement between CSB, ISEC (inc AGCC) and SECA to create an aligned governance structure for cricket in the region. I am incredibly pleased to announce that at a Special General Meeting of ISEC in April, member clubs decided unanimously to integrate their junior and All Girls Cricket competitions into the CSB framework from the 2019/20 season onwards. This momentous decision means that we can capitalise on our combined resources to deliver an even better cricket experience for participants and volunteers in the region.

A special thanks go to the members of the Integration Steering Committee for their tireless work in bringing about this wonderful outcome, and to the member clubs for their willingness to engage with open minds and view the opportunity through the lens of their members.

Unfortunately, at the time of writing this report, the SECA executive and member clubs have not been able to advance our discussions to a vote. However, the dialogue between our organisations remains open and strong, and will continue over the next few months.

Of course, none of the above could have been achieved without the tireless work and commitment of many individuals and supporters.

- To our network of volunteers. It is no understatement to call this group the lifeblood of the game as without them the game would simply not exist.
- To our players, coaches and umpires, a huge thanks for the spirit you bring to the field each and every week that exemplify the values of CSB.
- To the staff at Cricket Victoria, ably lead by Warren Griffin and Darren Anderson, whose unflinching commitment to growing and supporting the game in the Cricket Southern Bayside region, a huge thank you.
- I thank our sponsors and supporters for providing us with the resources and support our game needs to thrive.
- To our Local Government partners, a huge note of gratitude for being amazing supporters of community sport.
- And finally, but by no means least, to our member clubs. Thank you for putting your trust in the CSB Board. We could not do what we do without it and we are driven each and every day to repay it.

On a personal note I would like to thank Graeme Cunnington, Paul Glew, Meghan Mayman, Penny Callaghan, Andrew Kahofer, Iain Giles, Phil Cox and Rob Elliot, the CSB Board for their support. They are an amazing group who meet each and every challenge put before them.

Looking forward, the year ahead promises to be just as exciting as we work to seamlessly integrate the ISEC Juniors and AGCC competitions into our framework. Operations Report





On the field, 2018/19 was a big season. We welcomed Cluden, Colombo, Emmanuel South Oakleigh, St Brigid's/St Louis and a combined Washington Park/West Bentleigh team to the competition. Our representative cricket program expanded to include a senior men's and women's team as well as junior male and female teams.

Across the season, some 1735 players took the field, representing 32 affiliated clubs and 96 teams. Pleasingly 81% of all clubs played some form of finals this season and 15 different clubs celebrated a premiership.

Our umpire panel has grown again this season, despite the loss of a couple of umpires to the higher ranks of Premier Cricket. We now have 38 accredited umpires across the competition but further recruitment to the panel is vital to ensure a greater spread of match officials through the divisions.

The feedback we have received from our clubs and players from our end of season surveys has been overwhelmingly positive. This information is vital in ensuring we are performing to the expectations of our members as well as providing opportunities and support systems that allow development and growth.

I would like to thank each of the club administrators and volunteers. We have some great conversations around the grounds on matchdays and I very much enjoy those opportunities. We also have some conversations that aren't easy to have, but, we have found a way to have them by respecting one another's views. Our (CSBMT's) aim is provide appropriate protection of the pennant rules and policies of the competition, administer them consistently and provide the players the best chance to be involved at a level suited to their skill and time commitments.

It is also appropriate to thank the members of the Tribunal and Appeals panel, who voluntarily give of their time to assist in managing issues. With little notice they are called upon to adjudicate on matters sometimes far from pleasant and not what we want in our competition. A number of other people and groups have provided vital support and assistance throughout the season, these include:

- Paul Jensen, Gary Murray and Paul Daicos for their assistance in their roles across the season.
- The Competition Advisory Groups for the time they have given up to help set the direction and rules of each competition.
- James Seeary, Michael Hogan, Sarah Elliot, Hannah Bailes and Sam Cook for their work with our representative teams.
- The CSB team members, Warren Griffin, Luke Meyer, Paul Gilchrist, Emma Gallagher, Andrew Warrick and Mitch Spong for the support throughout the season not just to the competition, but to our clubs, schools and local community.
- The CSB Board for their overarching support and direction.

In closing, the 2019/20 season is shaping as our biggest yet and I look forward to welcoming our new clubs and players to the competition.

In 2018, Cricket Southern Bayside added an Indoor Cricket arm to the zone. Entering a men's team in the Cricket Australia national competition (NICL) during the autumn and winter months.

Affectionately dubbed the 'Ducks' by the team, (based on not getting off the mark in the win column), the team lost the nickname in the last game of the season with their maiden win against Monash Tigers. From a lacklustre domestic season Jordan Hesline, Jai Lemire, Josh Sugden, Reiley Mark and Benji Gore represented Victoria at the 2018 National Indoor Championships in Toowoomba. From here, Jordan, Jai, and Reiley stepped up to the world stage, playing for Australia in Christchurch and becoming World Champions. Future CSB player Declan McComb also represented Australia in Christchurch.

The end of season awards saw Ian Leach (Captain/Coach) take out the Most Valuable Player Award, whilst Aaron Fenton received the batting award and Mark Henry the bowling award based on their performances in each of the home and away matches.

In 2019, the one NICL team has gone from strength to strength. Following a merger with the Springvale, the newly formed Southern Bayside Seahawks, now boasts four teams, two which participate in the NICL (Men's and Women's) and two separate Superleague teams which participate in the Indoor Sports Victoria competition.

To compliment the participation pathway a junior competition has also been established at the Oakleigh Indoor Sports Centre with 16 teams representing local outdoor clubs.

We now have the base for a strong sustainable indoor cricket program which can compliment the outdoor program by operating during the autumn and winter months of the year.







Umpires Report



The 2018/19 season has been one of consolidation and improvement. As a result the panel has developed rich depth and talent.

The mantra of 'challenging yourself' and encouragement to do better has paid off. The competitive nature of the game flows through to umpiring, adding an edge to one's performances.

The panel increased to 38 umpires this season, of which 20 are Representative Accredited Officials (Level 2) and 18 are Community Accredited Officials (Level 1). We had six members experienced Championship Division for the first time (Charles Abetz, Steve Wunderlich, Steve Yeats, Dave Moran, Mark Peterson & Amit Wadhwa) and conducted themselves very well in our top division.

The standing of CSB umpires was rewarded by members of the panel being asked to officiate in the International Fellowship of Cricket Loving Rotarians Festival and the Under 13 series between CSB and Cricket Tasmania in January. The performances or umpires standing in these games was highly regarded by the competitions' management and provided valuable experience for the umpires.

Our monthly training sessions were well attended and allowed the panel to bounce situations off each other as well as work on technique and ways to handle certain situations.

Match day unavailability caused issues throughout the season which affected our ability to have officials posted throughout all of the divisions. This as well as recruiting our panel members for next season will be the critical areas to address to ensure as many matches as possible have an umpire appointed to them.

UNDER 13 CRICKET TASMANIA SERIES

In the week leading up to the Australia Day weekend, Cricket Southern Bayside played Tasmania in an Under 13 Series. Cricket Tasmania made an approach to CSB to play the series, in lieu of their attendance at the School Sport Victoria National Championships held in Bunbury Western Australia.

This was seen as a great opportunity for a selected boys and girls team representing the Cricket Southern Bayside Area, to compete in a Series against a State representative team. The teams were selected from ISEC & SECA and the AGCC.

The tournament was played on hard wickets at Basil Reserve, East Malvern and on turf at Waverley Oval, East Malvern and Percy Treyvaud Memorial Park, Chadstone. T20 fixtures were scheduled on the Monday at Basil, one day fixtures for the Tuesday and Thursday on turf, and a T10 on the Friday morning back at Basil (T10 fixture due to extreme heat).

The Tasmanian girls team was a Development team, as Cricket Tasmania continue to work hard on developing female cricket in the State. Our girls were more advanced in their cricket development and accordingly were quite dominant in their performances. Nonetheless, it was a positive experience for the CSB and Tassie girls.

In the boys, Tasmania was just a fraction too strong for the CSB team across the week. However, our boys improved significantly as a team as the week progressed, and this was highlighted by a magnificent win on the Thursday at Percy Treyvaud. Chasing 136, CSB made 8/138, winning in the 37th over (40 max).

The week was a great collaboration between Cricket Tasmania and Cricket Southern Bayside and was superbly supported by East Malvern Tooronga CC and all of the CSB player parents.

WOMEN'S REPRESENTATIVE MATCH - CSBW vs NMCA

Friday 22nd February 2019. An ordinary night in the Northern Suburbs of Melbourne, where the lights at Ruthven Reserve are shining, and a large crowd has gathered to watch a game of T20 Cricket. If you had been driving past, you would have looked twice and wondered who all those people were there to watch.

Several hundred people gathered at Ruthven Reserve in Preston, to witness the first ever Inter Association Representative Women's Match in Victorian Cricket history. Whilst women's cricket has been played in Victoria for over one hundred years, there has only ever been one association, the Victorian Women's Cricket Association (VWCA), who administered this and thus, no opportunity at a local level for representative games between associations. Until now.

NMCA won the toss and elected to bat first. The home side posted a solid 2/101cc on a slow outfield from their 20 overs. CSB's run chase got off to a flyer of a start before NMCA put the brakes on the CSB innings. Unfortunately, as the light diminished and the NMCA bowlers continued to hit their line and length we fell short in the chase, finishing on 6/79cc

Parkdale's Sascha Pribil was named CSBW's Player of the Match by the umpires, whilst Sina Mason was adjudged NMCA's Player of the Match.

MOST VALUABLE PLAYERS

Championship Division

South Caulfield's English all-rounder Bradley Erasmus capped off a big first season in Cricket Southern Bayside by winning the Championship Division Most Valuable Player award. Erasmus out-polled Beaumaris captain Sam Coates and Bonbeach spearhead Dan Mueller to win by 2 votes.

Erasmus had a monster year, scoring 912 runs at an average of 60.8 whilst also picking up 26 wickets with the ball. Bradley's blistering 87 in the Grand Final set the tone for South winning the flag.

Division One

Brad Kruger made it back-to-back Division 1 Most Valuable Player awards as he enjoyed another prolific season with Murrumbeena. Bayside's English recruit Nick Oxley finished in second place ahead of Matthew Walker from Mentone.

Kruger scored 778 runs at an average of 64.8 and grabbed 21 wickets at an average of 17.5. Brad's 95* in the White Ball Final earned him the Player of the Match award and a premiership medallion.







Division Two

Despite playing just 7 home-and-away matches, Cheltenham's Scott Neeson was named the Division 2 Most Valuable Player after a fast finish to the season. Neeson finished 1-vote clear of Parkdale United captain Calum Ravesi and Port Melbourne's Ollie Bocking.

Neeson made 223 runs at an average of 57.3 as well as picking up 20 wickets at a miserly average of 10.3. His 60* in the Semi Final proved influential to cheltenham's premiership success.

Women's Competition

Omega's all-rounder Jordon Cooper was named the inaugural Women's Competition Most Valuable Player ahead of Carnegie's captain Penny Callaghan and Nicky Ncube from Aspendale.

Cooper made 193 runs at a staggering average of 96.5 and took 18 wickets at an incredible 6.4 average. Jordon almost dragged Omega over the line in the Grand Final but unfortunately her 30* was enough in the run chase.

The directors of Cricket Southern Bayside submit herewith the financial report for the financial year ended 30 April 2019. To comply with the provisions of the Corporations Act 2001, the directors report as follows:

FINANCIAL REPORT

It gives me great pleasure to present the financial report for season 2018/19 for Cricket Southern Bayside. This season we delivered a surplus of \$15k, lower than last season but in line with our operating plan.

Reported revenue for the period was \$297k, slightly up from \$290k in the previous season.

Key revenue items included:

- Umpires fees \$92k, slightly up on the previous year which included higher payments to qualified umpires.
- Equipment and Ball sales \$78k, \$14k lower (offset with lower Cost of Goods Sold) due to clubs managing their stock levels
- Sponsorship \$57k up \$15k including new sponsors supporting Women's and Indoor cricket together with increased support from Kookaburra
- Registration fees \$47k, up \$14k reflecting the introduction of the indoor competition (offset by higher match expenses)
- Grants were down \$10k, following one-off Vic Health grant received last season to establish our Women's Competition
- Other income and Advertising \$22k, remained steady

Expenses were \$282k, up from \$259k in the previous season.

Key expense items were:

- Umpire and honoraria expenses of \$110k, up \$6k mainly due to higher umpire costs (offset above), more representative cricket and additional honorary payments.
- Cost of sales of equipment and balls \$76k, down \$13k due to lower number of balls sold (offset by lower equipment and ball sales above).
- Equipment \$40k which included Kookaburra club kits and balls provided to our Clubs
- Match expenses \$13k for indoor competition (offset by higher registration costs)
- Apparel \$13k, up \$7k due to the inaugural "Battle of Bayside" fixture, Women's representative match and the combined ISEC/SECA boys and girls matches against Tasmania.
- Other categories including Events, Trophies, Administration, Professional fees and Catering expenses reflected modest increases reflecting the growth in the competitions.

Our balance sheet continues to build which includes; Cash at bank just under \$48k, match ball stock \$3k and receivables of \$17k which is higher than last season but at the time of writing, receivables were down to \$2k.

Overall, this has been a good result in our third season. We continue to grow our competitions in men's, women's and indoor across the region. Our aim remains to build our financial position to a level whereby we can self-fund all our competitions. I would acknowledge the ongoing support of Cricket Victoria through funding of CSB staff, the provision of an interest free loan (paid back within the season) and use of their resources throughout the season.

Next season will be an exciting time for Cricket Southern Bayside with the admission of Mordialloc and St Brigid's/St Louis Cricket Clubs into the senior competition and the integration of the ISEC competition as we continue to build Cricket Southern Bayside into the leading community cricket competition in the state.

I would like to thank Rod Kimmitt our Chairperson, Warren Griffin Area Manager, Darren Anderson Operations Manager, my fellow Board members and all of our Clubs for their continued support.

1. Statement of significant accounting policies

a) Statement of compliance

The board has determined that the incorporated association is not a reporting entity because there are no users dependent on general purpose financial statements. The financial report is a special purpose financial report which has been prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012.

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with following Australian Accounting Standards:

- AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements
- AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors

b) Basis of measurement

The financial statements have been prepared on an accrual basis and are based on historical cost and do not take into account changing money values except where specifically stated.

2. Statement of significant accounting policies

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to all periods presented in these financial statements.

c) Income tax

The association is a not-for-profit organisation and is exempt from income tax under section 50-45 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

d) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits, held at call with banks, other short- term highly liquid investments with original maturities cash within three months.

e) Revenue

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable. Donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

f) Inventory

Inventory held for sale are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

g) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of an asset or as part of an item of expense. Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of GST.

h) Trade creditors and other payables

Trade and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the company during the reporting period, which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days on recognition of the liability.
