It is my great pleasure to present the 6th Annual Report of Cricket Southern Bayside and my first as Chair.

After successfully navigating the enormous challenges season 2020-2021 threw at us all, we entered season 2021-2022 with knowledge and somewhat acceptance of the COVID protocols and processes we would need to continue to follow, to ensure we were able to play cricket.

Participating in Community Sport is such an important part of our social, health and wellbeing fabric and with so much of it cancelled over the last two years, Cricket was again extremely fortunate to be able to play. Adding to the previous year's norms of QR Codes check ins, Hand Sanitizer, no communal Tea breaks, no sharing of drink bottles, or handing caps to umpires, proof of Vaccination and Rapid Antigen Testing (RAT's) entered our daily conversations.

I would like to acknowledge the support, leadership and ongoing communication provided by Cricket Victoria (CV) to assist Community Associations and Clubs navigate the myriad of State and Federal requirements to enable Cricket to play. Although there are those that question how committed CV are to Community Cricket, their dedicated support over the last two years with regards to COVID must be applauded.

I think it would be fair to say some fatigue was felt by all our Member Clubs Committees, players, coaches, volunteers, and supporters to firstly understand and secondly implement all the existing and new COVID protocols imposed. On behalf of the Board and the Competition Management Groups (CMG's) I would like to thank each and every one across the CBS family for "getting through" and as we move into season 2022-2023, we can hopefully return to a somewhat normal cricket season, last seen in 2019-2020.

At the AGM last year, our inaugural Chair, Rod Kimmitt, stepped down as Chair after five years at the helm. On behalf of the Board and indeed all our Members I would like to acknowledge and thank Rod for his leadership of Cricket Southern Bayside (CSB) from its conception to implementation in 2016-17. Embracing Cricket Victoria's Melbourne Metropolitan Cricket Strategy (MMCS), CSB started with 23 Senior Men's Clubs entering 78 teams across 10 divisions to form the CSB Men's Competition. Rod's leadership and commitment to the MMCS over his tenure, has seen CSB introduce a Women's competition and

successfully integrate Inner South East Cricket (ISEC) and the All Girls Cricket Competition (AGCC).

Championing a new strategic model for Community Cricket Associations to provide "Cricket your Way" to Member Cubs, CSB, under Rod's stewardship has seen 1 competition with 23 Clubs grow to now 4 competitions with some 70 Clubs, 460 teams, playing across 60 divisions on Tuesday's, Wednesday's, Friday's, Saturday's and Sunday's, certainly delivering "Cricket your Way", to our Members.

Rod's contribution to CSB will never be forgotten and he will always be a part of the CSB family. To recognise his enormous contribution, we were very happy Rod has accepted our nomination to bestow Life Membership of CSB on him. I am sure you will all join me in congratulating him.

As previously advised to Members, the restructure of Community Cricket support by CV caused many Associations to rethink their operational and financial models moving forward. The strategy on which CSB was formed and detailed in CV's MMCS, remains our current strategy with regards to its purpose. What has changed is the withdrawal of financial support by CV.

Community Cricket Associations, in Victoria, will continue to face some major challenges and importantly need to make major decisions on their sustainability moving forward. From CSB's perspective, we are seeing a growth in the number of players across all formats, which is fantastic, but on the other hand, with that growth, comes the need to support the greater burden placed on our Club volunteers.

CSB's strategy has always been to:

- Bring together existing cricket associations under a single governance model to increase the profile and participation of cricket across the Region and evidenced by the integration of ISEC and the AGCC into CSB in April 2019.
- Champion a model that delivers resources to the Region to support the volunteers at competition and club level, evidenced by the continued employment of an Operations Manager.
- Provide players and supporters "Cricket your Way" through competitions for Men, Women, Juniors and Girls that are both at a level commensurate to their ability and passion and in a geography that is not detrimental to participation.

The model we use to implement our strategy is:

1. **A Volunteer Board of 6 Elected Directors and up to 3 Nominated Directors** having specific responsibility for portfolios such as, Governance, Risk, Finance, Stakeholders (CS, CV, VMCU, LGA's, Sponsors) Men's, Women's, Juniors, All Girls Competition, and Umpires.
2. **A Paid Operations Manager** with responsibility to support:
 - 2.1. The Board with Club Compliance, LGA, Cricket Victoria, Cricket Australia, Stakeholders, Sponsors, Communication (Website, Social Media).
 - 2.2. The Competition Management Groups (CMG's) with Fixturing, Ground Allocation, Communication, Club liaison, Governance, Representative Cricket, Tribunal Secretariate.
3. **Competition Management Groups (CMG's)** comprising of Club nominated volunteers, CSB Director(s) and the CSB Operations Manager who have autonomy to manage their competition including rules, divisions, formats and fixturing.
4. **Umpires Management Group (UMG).**

CSB were very pleased to appoint Ben Cavey as our Operations Manager in November 2021. Ben having both played and coached cricket within the Bayside area is familiar to many members and I would like to thank him for the fantastic support he now provides to the Board, Clubs, the four CMG's and UMG.

In addition to the enormous number of Club volunteers working tirelessly within their own Clubs, I would also like to also thank the 30 + volunteers who sat on the 4 CMG's and the UMG throughout the season. The contribution you all made to your competitions and the many nuances and issues your dealt throughout the season, demonstrate that the CSB Family, working together, delivers a Cricket experience we all should be proud of.

From a CSB Board perspective, we welcomed new Directors Jeannie Dean, Tim Boyce and Clare Haysom on to the Board and thank outgoing Director Meghan Mayman for her insightful and focused contribution during her time on the Board.

At this year's AGM Paul Glew and Penny Callaghan stepped down as Directors of CSB after significant contributions to CSB's continued success.

Paul has been on the CSB Board since inception and his contribution at both the Board and the Men's Turf Competition tables has been nothing but phenomenal. His commitment to the CSB strategy since inception and his ever-ending passion and expertise to support and grow the Men's competition cannot be overlooked and will be hard to replace. Thank you, Paul.

Penny brought a professional and passionate voice and contribution to the CSB Board. Under her watch CSB introduced the Women's competition and she leaves the Board and our Association in a better place than she found it. Thank you, Penny.

Along with Paul, Penny, Tim, Jeannie and Clare, I would like to thank my other co-Directors, Graeme Cunnington, Rosalind Batson and Peter Fitchett for their ongoing support and contribution in making CSB a Cricket Association that always looks to provide "Cricket your Way" to our Member Clubs, Players and Volunteers.

CSB is a Member based Organisation and shaped by the participation, contribution and wants of our Member Clubs. I see the role of the Board is to deliver on the Members wants but do so in a way that ensures the operational and financial sustainability of CSB into the future.

To our sponsors Kookaburra, Knights Sports, Bentleigh RSL and Garrleigh Trophy Centre, thank you for your continued support. Your contributions to Community sport does not go unnoticed and I urge all CSB Clubs to utilise our sponsors products as much as possible into the future.

In closing I would like to wish all of the CSB family a successful, healthy and enjoyable 2022/23 season as we hopefully move into a post COVID environment.

I would like to congratulate and thank all CSB Clubs, players, officials, volunteers, umpires, the CSB Board, CMG's, competition administrators and local government authorities for a successful 2021/22 cricket season across the four CSB competitions. The presence of COVID meant that all competitions were played in a one day format. We negotiated COVID, through ever changing restrictions and rules, together. Thank you for working with us and thank you for your patience and understanding. It is a privilege to be able to play cricket in these times and we saw some fantastic cricket played across all our competitions.

CSB Operations covers support of the four CSB competitions; the All Girls Cricket Competition (AGCC), Inner South East Cricket (ISEC), Cricket Southern Bayside Women's (CSBW), and Cricket Southern Bayside Men's (CSBM) competitions and work with the Umpire Management Group (UMG) and Competition Management Groups (CMG's). The key successes during the season were building relationships with local government authorities, Cricket Victoria community cricket staff, and supporting CSB competition management volunteers.

We had so many girls and boys, and women and men take to the field last season, representing 71 affiliated clubs across 438 teams in the CSB competitions. 83% of clubs across the competitions played finals and 31 different clubs celebrated a premiership. A summary of Premiership winners and individual performance winners is appended to this annual report.

It was a challenging season in lots of ways and the behaviour of some player's, officials and supporters at times tested the spirit of how we want cricket played across all Cricket Southern Bayside competitions. Play hard. Play fair. The responsibility for ensuring this rests with everyone involved in the game of cricket; captains, players, coaches, umpires, and supporters. Respect is central to the Spirit of Cricket. On this note, I would like to thank the Tribunal Panel Members for volunteering their time across the season.

As we say across this report, CSB cricket competitions are to be played your way, and will continue to be played how you, as the majority, want it to be played to make better competitions. We had great support for the CMG's but greater support is needed. It is important that we have clubs represented on CMG's and the Board, and that club officials attend meetings to share their important views about how we do cricket at CSB. I believe Cricket Southern Bayside is the best community cricket competition in the state and it needs us all to play our part.

The CSB website was relaunched, and we looked to share highlights across social media. Next season we'd like more engagement where we ask you all to let us know about club, player, or official milestones so that we can share and celebrate them with the broader cricket community.

I would like to thank the CSB clubs and players for a warm welcome to me in the CSB Operations Manager role and I am grateful for the support that all the CSB Board, CMG's and UMG have provided to me. I would like to thank Cricket Victoria, in particular Darren Anderson and his guidance, assisting me in the role.

I look forward to working with you and the CMG's in build-up to the season and during season 2022/23. May it be a successful one for you and your club.

On Wednesday 21st July 2021 ISEC formally integrated under the administrative overlay of Cricket Southern Bayside (CSB). I would like to thank all at CSB, in particular, Iain Giles, Rod Kimmitt & Graeme Cunnington, for ensuring the decision to integrate with CSB was the right one. Over the first 12 months of full integration, from an ISEC perspective, the unanimous decision taken by clubs was overwhelmingly the right one, as the broader Association is strong financially, administratively and operates with a ‘Club First’ mantra and focus. I would also like to particularly thank Ben Cavey – CSB Administration Manager – for the power of work he has done in this new role.

Our ISEC focus needs to remain firmly on doing what we do well – delivering an enjoyable experience to every player from every club in a way that makes them feel supported, such that their cricket experience is a positive one, allowing them development as a player and fun with their friends. If we do that, we will generate parental support and enthusiasm for the game.

In the past season, over 3000 boys and girls participated in playing cricket across ISEC:

- 270+ teams played in the 32 Home & Away competitions - we were able to add 4 new competitions named after ISEC Club legends Sam Hill, Brendan Smith, Jason Traplin and Howard Machlin.

- Over 1000 kids played in Master Blast programs run by ISEC Clubs whilst another 1200 played across the broader CSB Clubs.
- 120 girls and boys played representative cricket for ISEC across 9 teams.

We thank the work all our affiliated Clubs do throughout the year to promote cricket, and specifically acknowledge the volunteers within those Clubs who are the backbone of ensuring community cricket continues to survive and provide boys and girls the opportunities to play. As more clubs put teams into our competitions, we are blessed with an even greater bench strength of volunteers.

This year ISEC fielded 9 Representative Teams in the January VMCU carnival, winning U18 Phil Arnold Shield for the second consecutive year. I would like to thank our Representative Coordinator, Peter Ciavarella, and our fantastic group of coaches and team managers for their delivery of an outstandingly well conducted program that provided all boys, girls and parents an experience I know (almost) all enjoyed.

I would like to thank our major sponsor Kookaburra Sport. Their continued support has been invaluable and has enabled us to:

- Dress our representative teams in a professional manner;
- Increased the level of coaching support for our Representative teams; &
- Secure good quality balls at excellent pricing.

We have a very strong contingent of umpires, who under the guidance of Ganesh Desai have helped us through a difficult administrative season well.

Finally, to Toorak Prahran who were winners of CSB Junior-ISEC Club of the Year, and to Glen Iris who were first time winners of Best Administered Club, our heartiest congratulations.

The role of the CMG is to leave the Competition in a better position than it found it and I believe we have continued that journey again this season. This was a season when if we had not been resolute in our desire to play a quality season, and strong in our commitment to doing so safely, we could have let a lot of people down across the state. We will continue to work with our affiliated Clubs and cricket stakeholders to strive to provide a cricketing experience for both boys and girls to develop, maintain and grow their love of cricket.

Peter Ciavarella has found a new role at Cricket Victoria and will unfortunately need to step off the CMG, although at this stage will remain our Representative Cricket Co-Ordinator. Greg Hansen will step off the CMG as well but will replace Pete as a Director on the VMCU Board. Both have been crucial to the growth of ISEC and the integration with CSB.

I look forward to your support and engagement in the coming season.

All Girls Cricket Competition Report



The All Girls Cricket Competition (AGCC) had another outstanding season despite the impact of Covid-19 on sport and the wider community. Due to the pandemic, the season started late and we had a number of games that were rescheduled due to covid impacts. In a couple of instances games were called off. Despite the challenges that 2021/22 threw at us the competition continues to grow and managed 13 or 14 rounds of cricket for the majority of our grades.

Well done to all the Clubs and teams on the way they handled the CovidSafe protocols, were flexible with the way we played, and did everything they could to have our juniors be able to take the field.

Saying that, there was a sense this season that many people were fatigued from the previous two years and emotions were often heightened. The AGCC had to conduct more performance recovery phone calls and provide formal warnings than any of its previous seasons. We hope that as we draw closer to the 22/23 season, we are building greater emotional endurance and return with a focus on the enjoyment of playing community sport.

The Competition

64 teams participated across 31 clubs with just over 600 players. This is an increase of 8 teams from the previous season which is remarkable considering there was no time to recruit leading into the season. Close to an extra 100 players joined the competition.

With the increase in teams, the AGCC evolved the competition structure as follows:

With the evolution of the Competition, we are keen to ensure our history is not lost in the process. To this end, the 16&Under A competition is known as the Annabel Sutherland Shield and the 16&Under B competition is known as the Libby Nicholls Shield. Formerly these names were used for Cups in the 16&U and 13&U competitions for those teams finishing 5th - 8th as a way of accommodating for the disparity between the capability of teams. Being able to divide the age groups into different grades has been of huge benefit to the Competition.

In recognition of the work done by Sven Samild to establish the Under 18 competition along with his commitment to making the AGCC a professionally run competition, we are pleased to have named the Under 18 Competition after him this season.

Representative Cricket

A significant number of players were involved in Representative Cricket during the season. This includes the VMCU Carnival U12, U14, U17 (for ISEC, the DDCA and SECA) and the Youth Premier League for the Bayside Breakers, South-east Scorpions and Pioneers.

We also had a number of players represent Victoria in different competitions in the U16, U15 and SSV U12 age groups.

The AGCCs strong showing in these competitions continues to demonstrate the importance of a junior girls cricket competition.

Future of the Competition

Season 2022-2023 will see the AGCC celebrate its 10th year delivering an All Girls Cricket Competition across the South East and Bayside region, and we intend to celebrate this incredible milestone throughout the season. The growth we have seen, in teams, players, and Clubs each year, we believe is testament to the inclusive, transparent, and engaging philosophy that underpins the AGCC and will continue to provide the framework for its evolution.

A cornerstone to that philosophy is ensuring Clubs always "have a say" in how the competition evolves each year. We do this through many ways, but the Annual Planning Day is one of the most important events we run. The planning day provides the forum for Clubs to have consensus over topics such as rules, game formats, gradings, days of play and, for this year, how we celebrate the 10th season.



Recognition

The AGCC Competition Management Group (CMG) is to be commended on their efforts in ensuring the smooth running of the competition and keeping the intention and philosophy of the competition front of mind at all times. Thank you to Hannah Bailes, Ash Ventura, David Shephard, Joel Rembach and Sue Munday for their tireless work and commitment to the competition. Many of the committee members are currently coaches of an AGCC team as well as having other positions within their own Clubs. Finding time to dedicate to the AGCC obviously comes from a drive for something greater than themselves. Thank you for your passion and commitment.

We would like to make a formal mention of Hannah Bailes who will be officially stepping down from a position on the AGCC CMG. Hannah has given three seasons to the AGCC and has been the driving force behind our social media presence as well as having remarkable insight as to the minds of teenage girls. We wish her all the best as she focuses on her own game and ensuring a pathway into senior cricket for the junior players.

The AGCC is part of the Cricket Southern Bayside (CSB) family and as such benefits from the support of the CSB Board, the other CSB Competitions CMG's, the CSB Umpires Management Group and in particular, Ben Cavey, the CSB Operations Manager.

All together our players, parents, Clubs and the CSB team have made the AGCC not only the largest junior girls competition in Australia but more importantly a voice for the continued evolution of Girls cricket.

Thank you to all the clubs, coaches, team managers and parents who make our competition tick. The AGCC prides itself on having strong relationships within our community of volunteers and appreciates the time and effort they all contribute. The competition only succeeds because we do it together. And of course we all do it for the players because they deserve our efforts.

To every single player in the AGCC, we hope you enjoyed your season of cricket, achieved a personal best, made some new friends and had a ball. We hope you are looking forward to next season. We certainly are.

We were pleased that we were able to field two umpires for all the finals for the Men's and women's competitions.

It gives me great pleasure to present the financial report for season 2021/22 for Cricket Southern Bayside. The season was again impacted by the pandemic with a delayed start to the season. However, we were again able to get a full fixture of one day cricket for the regular season across all competitions.

For the year ended 30 April 2022, we delivered a surplus of \$99k, from income of \$533k and expenses of \$434k, an increase of \$66k above last season. The result includes a number of one-off benefits including ongoing COVID grants, reinvestment funding and a final settlement from Cricket Victoria.

Revenue for the period was \$533k, (FY21 \$475k), up \$59k.

Key revenue items included:

- Equipment and Ball sales \$173k, up \$4k.
- Registration fees includes; team affiliations and representative player fees were \$102k, up \$8k reflecting continued growth in teams and team fee increase.
- Umpires fees were \$101k, down \$5k reflecting lower umpire numbers, despite an increase in match payments. This has been a consistent trend for the past three seasons and continues to be a challenge for the game.
- Sponsorship & Royalties were \$82k, in line with last year. I would thank long time sponsors Kookaburra and Knight Sport for their ongoing support.
- Grants \$34k, up \$23k.
- Fines and Other Revenue were also up, the latter reflecting payment from Cricket Victoria.

Expenses were \$434k (FY21 \$442k) down \$7k. Key expense items were:

- Cost of sales of equipment and balls were \$161k, down \$3k.
- Umpire payments were \$110k, down \$7k mainly due to lower umpire numbers, as mentioned above.
- Honorariums and employee payments includes; competition management, representative coaches and honorary positions \$41k, down \$13k reflecting fewer representative teams and lower payments following adjustment to new operating model.
- Equipment \$39k, up \$3k and included Kookaburra club kits and balls provided to Clubs.
- Apparel included uniforms for our representative cricket teams was \$32k.
- Trophies \$16k, up \$5k and includes perpetual trophies.
- Administration expenses were \$13k, up \$4k due to website development costs.
- Match Expenses were \$11k, up \$2k due to higher ground charges.
- Other categories including Professional fees, Finance expenses and Other expenses reflected modest movements increases reflecting the growth in the competitions.

The balance sheet continues to build with Net Assets now just under \$221k. Cash at bank of just under \$200k, match ball stock \$7k, receivables of \$52k and payables are \$31k. At the time of writing, receivables were down to \$22k and payables are zero.

This has been another strong result for Cricket Southern Bayside. We have worked very hard since our inception to create a strong financial position. Over the next few seasons as we transition to funding of our administration, we expect to utilise some of these funds.

I would like to thank Ben Cavey and our Competition Management Groups for the immense amount of work they have done over the season in managing our competitions.

I would also like to thank our Chairman Iain Giles, all our Volunteers, my fellow Board members, and our Clubs for their continued support.

NOTES TO THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR PERIOD ENDED 30 APRIL 2022

1. Statement of significant accounting policies

a) Statement of compliance

The committee has determined that the incorporated association is not a reporting entity because there are no users dependent on general purpose financial statements. The financial report is a special purpose financial report which has been prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the *Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012*.

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with following Australian Accounting Standards:

AASB 101	Presentation of Financial Statements
AASB 108	Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors
AASB 1031	Materiality
AASB 1048	Interpretation of Standards
AASB 1054	Australian Additional Disclosures

b) Basis of measurement

The financial statements have been prepared on an accrual basis and are based on historical cost and do not take into account changing money values except where specifically stated.

2. Statement of significant accounting policies

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to all periods presented in these financial statements.

c) Property, plant and equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Plant and equipment

Although there are no reported values associated with Plant and equipment, it follows that any Plant & equipment will be measured on the cost basis less depreciation and impairments losses.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by the committee members to ensure that it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed based on the expected net cash flows that will be received from the assets' employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have been discounted to their present values in determining recoverable amounts.

Depreciation

Although there are no reported values associated with Plant and equipment at cost, it follows that the depreciable amount of all fixed assets, excluding freehold land will be depreciated on a straight-line basis over the asset's useful life to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready to use.

The depreciation rates that will be used for each class of depreciable asset are:

Plant and equipment	20%
Motor vehicles	25%

The assets' residual values and useful lives will be reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period.

An asset's carrying amount will be written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals will be determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains and losses will be recognised immediately in profit and loss.

When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation surplus relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

d) Impairment

At each reporting date the committee assesses whether there is objective evidence that a financial instrument has been impaired. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the income statement.

e) Income tax

The association is a not-for-profit organisation and is exempt from income tax under section 50-45 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

f) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits, held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities cash within three months.

g) Revenue

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable. Donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

h) Inventory

Inventory held for sale are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

i) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of an asset or as part of an item of expense. Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of GST.

j) Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of assets that necessarily take a substantial period of time to prepare for their intended use or sale are added to the cost of those assets, until such time as the assets are substantially ready for their intended use or sale.

All other borrowing costs are recognised in income in the period in which they are incurred.

k) Trade creditors and other payables

Trade and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the company during the reporting period, which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days on recognition of the liability.
